Message From President

15,000! That's how many youth have benefitted from OWTA's programs in a few short years. 2014 was an exciting and productive year. We introduced new programs, received accolades, and most importantly reached out to even more youth in our local community and internationally. In May we were given a Montreal Community Cares award in the Community Organization category. This award recognizes the unsung heroes that work to better the lives of people within the community. Our efforts and years of working with marginalized youth through the arts, continues to be an integral part of our mandate. In addition, in November we were recognized by the Canadian Race Relations Foundation for building awareness and understanding of Canadian values that are reflective of Canadian diversity for our in-school program, Songs of Freedom.



In October the Songs of Freedom tour was invited back to the UK for a second year to celebrate Black History Month in Europe. The tour continues to educate and empower youth by providing them with knowledge of cultural history of the African diaspora. We saw the participation of approximately 7,500 youth for all of our programs. There were new programs launched in 2014 that we look forward to continuing this year. The first is A.S.A.P. (After School Arts Program) which offers free visual arts and breakdance workshops to youth age 12-17. The second program is Overture Radio, which is a student run radio program (podcast based) that encourages youth to find their voice, promotes creative thinking and inspires self-expression.



As we take a final look back on 2014 we were very proud to reach a milestone; April marked our 5-year anniversary. To celebrate this occasion we hosted an event that drew a crowd of active community members and guests from both the municipal and federal level.

To carry out our goal of engaging youth, OWTA runs several programs throughout the year. The programs are diverse in nature, including music, dance and radio broadcasts. A.S.A.P (AFTER SCHOOL ARTS PROGRAM)

From January to May 60 youth participated in this free after-school program. **Break Dancing and Visual** Arts workshops were offered allowing students to fully explore their creativity.





Songs of Freedom

For a 5th consecutive year we visited secondary schools with an edutainment (education and entertainment) presentation in celebration of Black History Month. For the 5th anniversary of the tour we went on a national and international tour. We brought 50 presentations to schools in Montreal, Sherbrooke, Toronto, Brampton, Calgary, Edmonton, Vancouver, as well as cities in Europe including Manchester, Liverpool, London and Frankfurt. Approximately 6,000 youth benefitted from the presentation.

S.P.E.A.K.

New in our program catalogue the S.P.E.A.K workshops give teens the opportunity to discuss their thoughts and concerns on a variety of topics in an open and supportive environment. Youth participated in interactive trust-building activities, created music, engaged in visual arts projects and talked about issues that teenagers face today. Approximately 750 youth benefitted from 5 workshops.



Overture Radio

10 participants took part in our student run radio program (podcast based). Youth were provided with the tools and training to produce six hour long radio shows. Click the below link to hear the podcasts:

Songs & Stories

In its inaugural year students learned about the diverse history and culture of the African-Canadian experience through music with a 45-minute interactive presentation. The presentation celebrates Black History Month and approximately 600 youth benefitted from the presentation.
